Facts and Figures.



The name "Campello" appears in documents as early as the thirteenth century and is probably based on the word "field" - "campo". It is situated in the Leventina valley, 1370 metres above sea level, on the left side of the Ticino River, above Faido; it is like a balcony with a beautiful view overlooking the middle Leventina Valley and the Alps. In the valley there is the railway line and the motorway which, 20

km further north, exits from the mouth of the St Gottard tunnel and continues towards Italy.

Most of the houses are built of wood over a stone cellar in the traditional Leventinese style. A few of the bigger houses are all stone and these were constructed mainly by emigrant Ticinesi with their savings. In summer the windows have a colourful display of bright geraniums.

The highest number of inhabitants recorded was in 1881, when there were 277 adults living in the village. There are currently about 60 inhabitants living all year round (including the hamlet of Carì), although there are many other families who have a weekend/holiday home in Campello and visit there regularly. During the summer months and at Christmas the population goes over 1000.

The current church building was inaugurated in 1837 and was constructed mostly with the help of donations from the emigrants of Campello. The church was modernised in 1961 and is dedicated to Saint Margherita, the patron saint of the village whose feast day is always celebrated in July.

The commune/parish was originally linked with Calpiogna (the village below Campello on the road from Faido to Carì) until the separation, first from the parish (1837 and then from the village council (1853). Nowadays it is a combined community with Carì, small ski resort 4km higher up the mountain.
